Re:concile Relationships Philemon 1-21

When someone you love breaks your heart. They hurt you so badly it's impacted much of your life, so badly you're not sure you can ever forget, let alone forgive. Yet in your heart you know you're supposed to forgive them. Or maybe it's you who has done the hurting. You've righted the wrong as best you could, moved past it, turned your life around, made peace with God--and yet you can't seem to forgive. All these things stand in the way of our ultimate peace and wholeness in the Lord: true reconciliation. Reconciliation has much to do with transformation: it's the moving from a place of separation, hurt, and brokenness to a place of healing, wholeness, forgiveness, and reunion.

In our text, Paul is attempting to broker a reconciliation between two people. The people he is attempting to bring together is Onesimus and Philemon. Onesimus stole something from Philemon and then ran away. Paul wants Philemon to reconcile with Onesimus and build a new relationship. This text gives us a blueprint for reconciliation.

Where does the courage for reconciliation come from? What does reconciliation really mean? How does reconciliation benefit a family or congregation?

- 1. Reconciliation on the Basis of Love-- For I have derived much joy and comfort from your love, my brother, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you. As we practice religious facet of love, it restrains selfishness of the human heart. Love draws people together; selfishness separates them. Reconciling with someone means putting the memory of the mean words they may have used in the past. The tongue is the great medium of social intercourse, and it must be brought under control. God expressed His love for us through Christ. He covered our sins in Him. Thus, through faith in Jesus we are reconciled to God. In that light surely we should be willing to cover sins done to us by other people. Not that we can forgive sin on God's behalf, but we can do so in our relations to others.
- 2. Reconciliation is an Overture of Grace--8 If he has wronged you at all, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. The key to reconciliation is forgiveness. Reconciliation means to take ones heart and put it in a different place than it was before. Reconciliation as overture of grace translates oneself in the position of need for a grace. We practice it through pressing our way to reconciliation. Grace give us the ability to move toward reconciliation. God has reconciled us to himself through Jesus Christ. Reconciling with someone you have broken relationship with is a means of grace.
- 3. Reconciliation is a Refreshing of the Heart ²⁰ Yes, brother, I want some benefit from you in the Lord. Refresh my heart in Christ. What we have to be realistic in saying is that attempting to reconcile with someone does not always result in reconciliation. Yet, when there is reconciliation, it is a refreshing of the heart. It also refreshes the hearts of your family and those connected to them. The word refresh refers to an inner rest. It refers to a perpetual praise of God. Meaning when reconciliation happens there is a praise which occurs because there is reconciliation with someone you had a broken relationship. Paul uses this word to describe his heart when reconciliation takes place.

To reconcile with someone who has hurt us is extremely difficult. We are never forced to reconcile but Paul is asking us to consider the hard work of reconciliation. This is a work that not only changes us but changes everything around us.

What is Per Capita?

Presbyterians share equally, responsibilty, and interdependently in the costs of governing the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), no matter the size of their congregations.

Our church is responsible for paying a per capita amount of \$36.25 per member, this money is taken from the yearly budget.

The \$36.25 per member is divided and is paid to the following:

\$24.00 - Kiskiminetas Presbytery, \$2.40 - the Synod of the Trinity, \$9.85 - General Assembly




Fall has been fun and we are looking forward to Thanksgiving activities.


