Christian Contentment Philippians 4:10-13

¹⁰ I rejoiced in the Lord greatly that now at length you have revived your concern for me. You were indeed concerned for me, but you had no opportunity. ¹¹ Not that I am speaking of being in need, for I have learned in whatever situation I am to be content. ¹² I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. ¹³ I can do all things through him who strengthens me.

Financially tough times, such as economic inflation, put people under intense pressure. Pressures like this can reveal hairline cracks in our characters that would have been invisible in more comfortable conditions. Sometimes we are in the position where the things we lean on crumble, people are forced to face the truth that sources from which we seek satisfaction and security are surprisingly fragile.

Tight budgets in crunch times pose two temptations for Christians and non-Christians alike: *anxiety* and *discontent*. Anxiety frets over the question "Will I have enough to survive, to meet my family's basic needs?" To such fear Anxiety typically answers, "Maybe not," or even "Probably not." So, Anxiety tends to close its fist around what little it has, afraid that hands that give too freely will end up empty. Discontent asks, "Do I have enough to make me happy, to satisfy my desires?" To that question Discontent *always* answers, "No, not enough, not yet." Therefore, Discontent, like Anxiety, keeps a tight grip on its treasures, and Discontent resents the fact that it doesn't have even more. The Apostle Paul understands the secret to being content.

The Apostle Paul says, "I've Experienced Life. *I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound*. The congregation at Philippi was experiencing some severe times. They were experiencing severe poverty. There was severe financial difficulty during the time Paul is writing the Philippian church. Even with all the financial problems the Philippian Church was having, they still wanted to support the Apostle Paul. The secret of contentment is not normally learned in posh circumstances or in deprived circumstances, but in exposure to both. Paul insists that his own contentment operates under both circumstances. "I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want" (4:12). Paul is content in both circumstances because his contentment is utterly independent of circumstances. Paul's contentment is focused on all that he enjoys in Christ Jesus. That means he has learned by hard experience a relaxed contentment whatever his circumstances.

I Can Do All Things Through Christ Who Strengthens Me. Paul is not claiming to be so strong that nothing can move him., nor is he saying be independent of circumstances by an act of the will. Paul immediately confesses that if he has reached this stage of contentment, he owes everything to God: "I can do everything through him who gives me strength" (4:13). The Apostle Paul is not claiming to be some kind of superman of Christianity. What he is saying is that because of what he has learned from life, how to live, he has learned to be content. DA Carson says it this way, "His point is that whatever the circumstances in which he finds himself, whether with the rich and the powerful or with the poor and the powerless, whether preaching with unction to substantial crowds or incarcerated in a filthy prison, he has learned to cast himself on God *and to be content.*"

Learning to be content is learning how to lean on Jesus. Learning to cast your cares upon Jesus is the secret of contentment. We are his people and the sheep of his pasture. You and I may suffer the problems of inflation, yet God is there to help us get through and be content through the power of the Holy Spirit.


